Suffolk County Survey Participants Can Help Save Lives, Reduce Property Damage

December 10, 2013 – RIVERHEAD, NY — Updating an all-out offensive against natural hazards and the lives and property they threaten, citizens across Suffolk County's 43 municipalities and two tribal nations are encouraged to participate in on online survey as part of critical hazard mitigation planning currently underway. Found at https://www.surveymonkey.com/s/V3RLXZ5, the survey is an important part of the County's five-year hazard mitigation plan to identify, prevent, and reduce risks and losses from natural disasters in this flood-prone county.

Spearheaded by a community planning committee and complemented with support from county, regional, and state agencies and stakeholders, the Suffolk County Hazard Mitigation Plan's citizen survey is designed to raise public awareness about local and regional hazards, and to gather key information to improve the County's efforts to "mitigate" or to protect public and private property and infrastructure from natural hazard events, such as floods, hurricanes, severe storms, and wildfires.

"Identifying, preventing, and reducing risks associated with natural hazards is everyone's responsibility," said Suffolk County <insert title, name>. It's not a question about *if* the next big storm will hit, but *when*. Our collective communities must be vigilant in ongoing efforts to become resilient to the effects of storms and other natural hazards. Vigilance starts with each county resident and business owner. We need everyone's help to prevent and reduce the loss of life and property."



Hazard Mitigation: Any action taken to reduce the loss of life and property by lessening the impact of disasters (natural, technological and man-made).

Suffolk County, along with its towns, villages and tribal governments, are in the process of updating the County's 2008 Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMP). This plan is required by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in order to be eligible for federal grant funding for public and private mitigation projects. The HMP must provide a "blueprint" by which local governments can make coordinated, cost-effective efforts towards reducing losses from natural hazards (hurricanes and Nor'Easters, coastal erosion, flooding, severe winter storms, wildfires, etc.). Q1 Please indicate your age range:




Q2 Please indicate in which municipality you live:





Q4 Do you own or rent your place of residence?









Q11 Do you have flood insurance?



Q12 If you do NOT have flood insurance, what is the primary reason?





Q11 Do you have flood insurance?



Q11 Do you have flood insurance?



Q12 If you do NOT have flood insurance, what is the primary reason?





Q11 Do you have flood insurance?





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Every event is different. No one wants to provide timely and accurate ETRs more than the utilities themselves. Those looking for ETRs need to be properly educated as to how ETRs are determined and when ETRs are able to go from being a "best guess" - based on prior similar type events and while there many still unknowns, to a fairly accurate projection based on identified damages and restoration requirements. Once utilities have had the opportunity to survey and analyze outages and their cause/damage, fairly accurate ETRs can be established. ETRs are being demanded before an event even hits and then there is an outcry if there is any deviation from what was projected, (based on forecasts (NWS) and similar past events). Going back to the prior question and expectations - the public has to understand that until science is perfect and identifies specifically the severity, impact and location of events, there has to be a clear expectation that projections and ETRs will need to change if an event is either more or less significant than initially forecast... Utility systems are wide spread and complex. The product they produce, if mis-handled, is deadly(Electric & Gas). There are established processes that must be followed for restoration-Surveys ("Rapid" takes upwards of 2 days and does not identify the many damages outside the primary system, & "Detailed Survey" down to the individual homeowner & may take upwards of 4-5 days), Only once these are complete and the true extent of damages known will accurate restoration estimates be available. The process has to then proceed with the restoration of transmission, followed by restoration to the primary distribution system, then the secondary distribution system and finally to individual customers. Often when accurate ETRs become available and are provided, there is dissatisfaction expressed due the ETR being longer than what the "expectation" has been set at, by influences outside the utility.
